




The Old Port of Tangier: Cradle of Legends, Crossroads of Worlds

Geraldine Knatz: What does winning the AIVP Antoine Rufenacht Prize mean for your organisation and your city? What impact has it had?

Mohamed Ouanaya: Receiving the AIVP Antoine Rufenacht Prize is a tremendous source of pride for Tangier City Port, for the City of Tangier, and for the Kingdom of Morocco as a whole. The award recognises the project as an outstanding example of city-port interface development. It celebrates not just the port project itself, but the wider ambitious vision championed by His Majesty King Mohammed VI to establish Tangier as a strategic crossroads between Africa and Europe, and a leading Mediterranean destination for cruise and leisure tourism.

The prize marks the culmination of more than a decade of hard work, innovation, and collaboration between Tangier's diverse community of stakeholders. Through this project, we aimed to breathe new life into a historic port area, transforming it into a model of sustainable, inclusive development that honours its heritage.

This award strengthens our resolve to continue building synergies between the port and the city, driving development that is sustainable, responsible, and innovative, and that puts citizens at the heart of everything we do. It also supports efforts to promote a blue economy aligned with the United Nations' 17 Sustainable Development Goals, forming a key pillar of AIVP's 2030 Agenda.

When you were developing the project, did you ever imagine it could become a model for other port cities? Since winning the award, have other cities reached out to learn more?

When we set out to redevelop Tangier City Port, we were fully aware of the positive impact it could have - not just on the city itself, but on the relationship between the port and its surroundings. Our goal was to bring new life to this iconic space, celebrate its historic heritage, and create an inclusive area that everyone could enjoy. Since joining AIVP in 2011, the relationship between the city and port has been at the heart of our thinking. The discussions, benchmarking exercises, and conferences organised by AIVP have been invaluable, helping us refine our approach and reinforcing our belief that other port cities could look to this project as a model.

Receiving international recognition through this award has been particularly rewarding, especially as it marks the first port redevelopment of this scale in the country. More

importantly, it effectively showcases the collective effort and commitment of all the stakeholders involved.

Since the project began, we've welcomed numerous delegations, experts, academics, diplomatic representatives, and officials from other port cities - all keen to learn from our approach. These exchanges have included site visits, institutional meetings, and the sharing of documentation. They have allowed us to reflect together on the challenges of transforming port areas into thriving urban spaces, and served to strengthen our conviction that ports can be powerful engines for sustainable development. Following the 17th AIVP World Conference in Tangier in May 2022, delegates from four continents came to visit the Tangier City Port complex.

Main components of the project



Tell us about the origins of your project and why it was necessary.

Once neglected with a fragmented economy, the city of Tangier embarked on a far-reaching transformation that began when His Majesty King Mohammed VI, May God Assist Him, came to the throne in 1999. An integrated strategic vision was adopted to establish Tangier and its surrounding region as an attractive, modern, and competitive socio-economic hub.

That vision led to major infrastructural and development projects, including the Tanger Med port complex, now a globally recognised logistics hub, as well as cutting-edge transport infrastructure, including high-speed rail, motorways, expressways, and more. Ambitious initiatives like Tanger Metropole, Tanger Tech, and Tanger Automotive City have further strengthened the city's appeal. At the same time, the regeneration of the Medina and the neighbourhood upgrades made have significantly improved residents' quality of life.

The Tangier City Port redevelopment project is part of a broader urban and economic transformation that began back in the early 2010s. The commissioning of Tanger Med made it possible to gradually relocate commercial activities away from the historic Tangier City Port, such as container traffic, TIR, bulk goods and passenger services. This in turn opened the way for an ambitious redevelopment project designed to reposition the city as a leading international destination for cruise and leisure tourism. To make this vision reality, SAPT deployed a comprehensive programme of studies and assembled a multidisciplinary team of internationally renowned experts. The decision also aligns with the 2030 National Port Strategy, which sets out strategic objectives to integrate environmental and urban priorities: Minimising the overall environmental impact of ports, for example by relocating certain traffic and flows to non-urban ports, and promoting tourism and recreational activities at ports.

Perspective view of the project



In your view, what is the most innovative feature of your project, in terms of design, implementation and outcomes?

The most innovative aspect of the Tangier City Port redevelopment is its integrated, multidimensional approach, balancing urban planning priorities with the need to ensure sustainability, attract tourists, and preserve and showcasing the city's existing heritage. The redevelopment has become a powerful symbol of Tangier's urban and economic renewal. By creating an open, accessible, well thought out space, it has effectively restored the connection between the city, the Medina, and the port.

The governance arrangements are also groundbreaking. Represented by various departments, the government handed responsibility for developing and implementing the project to SAPT, whose founding shareholders are the Hassan II Fund, the National Ports Agency, the Municipality of Tangier, and the Moroccan Agency for the Promotion and Development of the North. This structure shows how strongly public institutions have invested in shaping a project of lasting importance for the city.

The most striking change has been the removal of physical barriers between the city and its port, combined with the

protection of the historic seafront and the creation of spacious public areas including lively promenades, new squares, and extensive green spaces. The design makes full use of the city's topography, the bay and the Medina, bringing them together into a unique whole. Restoration has played a central role as well, with the city walls, gates and fortresses carefully rehabilitated to showcase Tangier's unique heritage.

On the environmental front, the project incorporates sustainable features such as solar panels to provide shade, the reuse of salvaged building materials, and responsible waste management. Going forward, a planned green maritime corridor between Tangier and Tarifa will strengthen ecological links across the Strait. Overall, the redevelopment embodies a holistic approach to urban growth. It supports cruise, ferry, and yacht tourism while also stimulating investment in real estate, hotel industry, culture, fishing, and events, and above all, restoring a strong connection between the city and its port.

View on the new port facilities



The Tangier project strikes a remarkable balance between tradition, culture, the economy and modernity. Can you tell us more about the design process and how these elements were considered when shaping the final plan?

The Tangier City Port redevelopment reflects a commitment to celebrating the local urban and maritime heritage, reconnecting the city with the sea, and seamlessly integrating the old Medina, the corniche, and the nearby historic districts.

Two essential priorities guided the project's design: the need to restore the city's access to the water, and to reconnect the port with the city, all while respecting the environment.

Our primary goal was to bring new life to an iconic space, showcase its rich heritage, and create an inclusive area that everyone could enjoy.

The design process drew on a series of strategic, urban, technical, environmental, and economic studies conducted by a multidisciplinary team of experts, including urban planners, architects, historians, archaeologists and representatives from civil society. Today, the project's impact on the city is tangible.

The €750 million redevelopment has delivered:

- Concrete economic and social benefits, giving a strong boost to inward investment and creating some 15,000 direct jobs, with additional indirect employment.
- New commercial spaces, enhancing local business activity and economic appeal.
- A diversified range of cultural, tourist, and event venues and services, expanding the city's capacity for leisure, culture, and large-scale events.
- Modern infrastructures, including a fishing port, marina, cultural and leisure spaces, and a ferry terminal.

Equally important is the preservation of cultural heritage. The project restored the historic city walls, gates and fortresses, showcased emblematic sites, and incorporated a business model and plan designed to ensure financial sustainability and long-term viability for investments. This structured strategic plan set out the parameters for each part of the project, determining its key features, the associated costs, and the timeline for completion.

Can you describe the stakeholder consultation process you followed when planning and designing your project? Have the relationships forged during the planning phase continued to strengthen the ties between the city and the port?

city-port redevelopment The Tangier engaged stakeholders at every level, with consultation processes carefully designed for each aspect of the project. One of the biggest challenges was freeing up port land. To address this, the project team worked closely with companies from the former free-trade zone, which employed around 10,000 people, and received support to help them build modern industrial units. Financial assistance was also provided to occupants of the former seaside zone, including artisans, public scribes and port workers. Consultations with local fishing industry stakeholders ensured that the new port's design met their requirements, improving both working conditions and the handling and marketing of local products.

To grow local cruise and yachting activities, the team held regular meetings and working groups with local authorities and tourism industry representatives including maritime and travel agencies, tour operators and guide associations. This collaborative approach ensured the value chain was built around these activities. A dedicated scientific committee, bringing together historians, archaeologists, architects, scenographers, and port representatives, guided the project's cultural vision. Their contribution ensured that the Medina's heritage was carefully preserved, while making the area more engaging and attractive. This inclusive approach helped build strong local support and created a smooth, harmonious connection between the port and the city.

That same spirit of active engagement and inclusion continues to shape events at the redeveloped site, which now plays host to a variety of sporting, cultural, and artistic events including GLOBE40, Ironman 70.3 Tangier, the Ibn Battuta Conference, the Charity Yacht Rally, the ILCA U21 World Championships, the Moroccan National Film Festival, and Tangier's Jazz Festival (Tanjazz).

With the benefit of hindsight, what lessons have you learned from the redevelopment of Tangier's city-port interface?

Looking back at the project, there are four key things that stand out.

1/ Stakeholder engagement is essential: a redevelopment on this scale cannot succeed without close consultation with all parties involved. Once isolated and difficult to access, the port is now fully integrated into the city. That success was made possible by an inclusive approach that took into account the relationships between each project component and its immediate environment.

2/ A flexible approach is best: unexpected challenges and technical, legal, and planning hurdles meant a great deal of flexibility was required. The plans had to be adjusted continually, to overcome issues with acquiring the land needed, adapt to external factors, and keep the project on track.

3/ The importance of effective ongoing management: Running the site demands constant attention, thoughtful planning, and organisational agility. Constant effort is needed to sustain a high standard of services, guarantee safety, adopt new technologies, and meet environmental requirements. This applies both to operators and to the company responsible for managing the port.

4/ A large-scale, long-term project calls for careful management of interfaces and protection of stakeholders: In order to successfully deliver a long-term project of this size, with a multitude of component parts deployed in stages, the interfaces between technical systems and stakeholders need to be managed very carefully. Smooth coordination and clear communication between all everyone involved are essential to maintaining consistency and keeping the project on track. This approach also serves to protect all stakeholders by anticipating risks and creating a safe, collaborative working environment throughout the project's lifecycle. These lessons underline how important agile governance, a collaborative approach, and a sustained commitment are to the success of such an ambitious urban redevelopment.

What are the next steps for strengthening city-port relations in Tangier?

This ambitious project, together with several major citywide initiatives, has significantly boosted Tangier's appeal. The city is now Morocco's second-largest by population and economic importance, while also seeing a big rise in tourist numbers.

Several strategic initiatives are now underway to build up the synergies between Tangier and its port even further. A strategic study is being prepared to guide the development of Tangier City Port over the period 2026 to 2030. It reflects Tangier's goals of becoming an ever more attractive destination, focusing on sustainability, and integrating the city into the surrounding region. On the operational side, the port is pressing ahead with QSE certification, incorporating ISO 9001 (quality), ISO 14001 (environment) and ISO 45001 (occupational health and safety), to ensure strong performance, safety and environmental standards. The digital transformation is also under way, with projects aimed at streamlining operations, making processes more transparent, enhancing the customer experience, and facilitating connections with economic stakeholders.

The cable car is part of the redevelopment plan. It will link the port with the Medina and the new city, making it

easier for cruise passengers, yachters, and residents to get around. In addition to providing a sustainable transport option, it will offer panoramic views of the Medina, the Kasbah, the Marina and Tangier Bay, adding to the city's tourist appeal. Construction has already started.

Meanwhile, the urban development is moving forward with a new 1,500-seat convention centre, two five-star hotels with a total of 1,200 rooms, and new retail and residential areas, all set within nearly 30 hectares of cohesively designed public spaces. The project is scheduled for completion in 2029, giving the port a new identity and making it more attractive. The promised "picture postcard" view will be in place in time for the 2030 World Cup, once the project is fully complete.

Last but not least, the port is looking at installing green power charging stations with a total capacity of 16 MW for cruise ships and large yachts, demonstrating its commitment to the energy transition and reducing CO2 emissions at berth.

Transforming a Historic Port Area into a Modern Multifunctional Center

Project Review

1 / Port Facilities

The redevelopment of the Tangier city port area has been accompanied by major investments in port infrastructure. A new fishing port was built to enhance local economic activity and fishermen's working conditions, while the existing quays were modernized to meet contemporary operational standards, particularly to accommodate cruise vessels. The passenger terminal was expanded and upgraded to improve connectivity and user experience. In parallel, the project included the development of a modern marina, a new harbor master's office, an administrative district, as well as a handicraft village. The historic mosque was rebuilt on its original site, at the entrance to the port, preserving its symbolic role as a city landmark. The handicraft village and the administrative district were developed outside the customs-controlled area to ensure accessibility and foster stronger interaction with the local community.


























